It is a test designed to measure your skill in the four skills of writing, speaking, reading and listening. After the test you will receive a score of 1-9. You use this score for admission to a university or to work abroad (institutions and employers decide what score they require). It is accepted by many institutions and employers in the UK, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and North America. There are four sections in the IELTS test, but some parts vary depending on whether you are taking the test to study abroad or work/live abroad. IELTS Academics: Studying Abroad The IELTS academic test is done if you are planning to study abroad in higher education or school facilities. The academic writing test takes 60 minutes and there are two parts. You will have to write an essay and analyze a chart or diagram.
